The way I see it...

...there are two issues that I have heard from most sawmills in the past 60 days: log exports and what to do with chips and dust.

Log exports. That is a topic that brings a mixed response from AHMI members. The volume of logs sold to China in 2017 is rising. The actual number is not available but more buyers are here and more containers of logs are being shipped.

I have learned that most sawmills are either selling logs directly or indirectly to export. I am a free markets believer and know that every person or company should be allowed to sell to the markets available to them.

BUT I also understand the questions raised about log sales to countries where the U.S. sells lumber. If these markets can buy the logs and make the lumber for their use, then why do they need.....I am not going to finish the question.

Logs going into China have an 11% tariff. Lumber going into China has a 16-17% tariff. American lumber producers already compete in China with Chinese produced walnut lumber. What species is next?

One Chinese timber importer told me last week that Chinese factories are building rough mills to cut the logs and dry the lumber on site. The owners say they can make the exact dimension they want and use every aspect of the log.

These are factories that U.S. lumber producers have been selling KD lumber. I don't know the answer but it is a discussion we need to have.

Chips and dust. A close second in hot topics for sawmills is what can they do with the chips and dusts from lumber production. Paper mills are closing and pellet sales are down - even the charcoal markets have plenty of supply.

Sawmills are piling up dust and chips and some are forced to haul it away. This former profit center has become an expense for some.

AHMI is talking with industry leaders and academia about new markets for low grade materials. Hopefully these become reality soon.

BUT KEEP IN MIND, these two issues are connected. Some logs are more profitable now than the lumber, chips and dust combined.

AHMI Members Discuss China Trade Impact

Five Appalachian Hardwood Manufacturers Inc. member companies recently discussed the impact of trade with China with officials from the U.S. Deprtment of Commerce International Trade Administration.

The meeting was organized by U.S. Sen. Shelly Moore-Capito at the request of John Crites II of Allegheny Wood Products. Four ITA officials and staff from the West Virginia delegation and one Virginia representative participated.

AHMI members presented a packet of materials about the growth of hardwood lumber exports from the United States to China. It detailed the dramatic rise of exports in the past 10 years and the volume of grade lumber products sold in 2016 to the Chinese market.

Each company related stories about the importance of continued free trade with Chinese manufacturers.

The Commerce Department officials shared information on current trade talks and ways the lumber industry can work with them to expand markets. The dialogue was positive and opened new contacts with the ITA.

SFI Takes Over Project Learning Tree

Tom Martin, President and CEO of the American Forest Foundation (AFF) announced recently that the sponsorship of the Project Learning Tree program will be transferred from AFF to the Sustainable Forestry Initiative (SFI). Pending successful legal and contractual arrangements, the formal transfer agreement is expected to be signed between AFF and SFI in July, 2017.

"PLT is aligned with SFI's mission, vision, and key objectives, and bringing the PLT program under SFI's umbrella will further SFI and PLT's reach in ensuring today's youth can be effective future leaders with a strong understanding of the value of responsibly managed forests, a commitment to sustainability, and the skills to make responsible decisions about the environment," Martin said. "PLT and SFI will also work together to engage youth in conservation activities and outdoor education."

The Problem For Hardwood Residuals

One of the best parts of being the Executive Director of the Hardwood Federation is participating in the various hardwood events around the country. My purpose is usually to give some remarks about what the Federation is working on and how our efforts help support the Hardwood industry. However, the real value for me is to hear directly from industry leaders about what issues are most troubling to them. In 2017 one concern is clearly on the top of the list.

The issue of residuals from mills has evolved from a mild apprehension in 2016 to a significant worry in the spring of 2017, particularly after another fairly warm winter in the eastern part of the U.S.

Sawdust and bark residuals were a profit center for the many mills that were able to sell their waste to paper and pellet mills. Paper mill closings have reduced demand, as have the relatively low prices of oil and natural gas, driving customers away from wood based heating systems fed by pellets.

The Hardwood Federation is working on two legislative efforts to help drive up demand for these wood residuals and perhaps offer some incentives for increased use of these materials.

1. Biomass Thermal Utilization Act (BTU ACT): The BTU Act would qualify high efficient biomass heating systems for the same investment tax credits (30 percent of installed cost) that wind, solar, geothermal and other renewables get. The heating systems can be whole home units or commercial heating systems.

Biomass thermal was not included in the original act creating these investment tax credits because there was no one here at the table when these credits were being crafted. While this has been mainly a pellet industry issue in the past, due to the increasing concerns from the industry, it is time for us to be more active. Our hope is that if enacted, more of these pellet run systems will be installed, which in turn creates more demand for the biomass fuels which are made from residuals the hardwood industry generates.

The bill's provisions actually made it into a

tax deal last year, before the deal fell apart. But it was progress and it is currently part of the leadership conversation around renewable energy tax credits. We are very optimistic that we will be able to find the right vehicle to move this initiative forward.

2. Community Wood Energy Program (CWEP): This program, contained within the Farm Bill also has potential to address the problem of residuals. CWEP was created to provide grants to projects that install wood heating systems in hospitals, schools, community centers and entire towns.

Currently, the program has authorization, but no money for the actual grants...far from an ideal situation. We are advocating for reauthorization and meaningful mandatory funding of \$50 million to fulfill CWEP's objectives, which includes supporting "capital investments for advanced wood energy and combined heat and power in public and private facilities and to support other uses of low value, low quality wood, with a preference for projects that use byproducts of wildfire, forest health treatments and **wood product manufacturers**, projects in areas that need markets for low value, low quality wood, or have limited access to pipeline natural gas."

The Hardwood Federation is a member of the Forests in the Farm Bill Coalition, which has a good track record of getting provisions into the Farm Bill. The plan now is to go get CWEP funding introduced as stand-alone bill with the objective of having it folded into the Farm Bill as it comes together next year.

A couple of cold winters would also be tremendously helpful in reducing the piles of sawdust currently sitting in mill yards, but as we cannot control the weather, we are focusing on legislative initiatives that we can influence. We will keep you posted on our progress!
